I studied oil painting until I went to college at [Columbia University](#), which is very academic so I was only able to paint for two semesters. 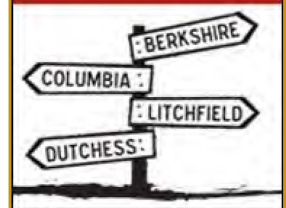
